READING ALOUD Charlie and the Chocolate factory

You will use the following text to record yourself.

Steps to follow:

- 1) Read the text a first time, aloud or not
- 2) Read the text a second time, aloud and underline every word that you don't know how to pronounce or that are hard to pronounce
- 3) Look-up the pronunciation of the unknown words
 You can do this by using Natural Online Reader and pasting the text in the box.
- 4) Read the text aloud and practice pronouncing complicated or unknown words
- 5) When you feel like you are ready, record yourself. It's ok to record yourself several times, until you are satisfied with your reading and pronunciation. Remember to not speak too fast.
